External Doors-

- 1) The external doors on the vestibule do not provide enough clear space for those with wheelchairs or walkers to pull the handle and maneuver around the open door. Bricks and rocks near the door limit the space behind a person as they try to open the door and enter the vestibule.
- 2) Signage- Neither external door into the vestibule is designated as the accessible entrance.





Clear Space

Preferred Solution:

Remove or alter the landscaping to provide 5 feet of clear space perpendicular to the door.

Alternative Solution: Provide a power door to allow for access into the vestibule

Signage-

Solution:

Provide a sign clearly designating the right entrance (facing the vestibule) as the accessible entrance.

Doors In Vestibule-

The current design presents an enormous barrier to entry for persons with disabilities. When entering from the right, the first door is hinged on the right. The door swings awkwardly away from a person in a wheelchair, requiring them to attempt to prop the door open (possibly with their chair) and attempt to maneuver into the building. It is also impossible to enter the building through the left-hand door since it opens into the center and does not allow for nearly enough space to maneuver around and into the restaurant.





Preferred Solutions:

- 1) Redesign the vestibule to provide for direct entry into the restaurant.
- 2) Remove one or both of the inner doors in the vestibule

Alternative Solution:

1) Provide a buzzer/doorbell to notify employees to help a customer enter the restaurant.

Bathrooms


Bathroom Doors-

Both the men's and women's bathrooms provide insufficient room on the handle side of the door. A shelf attached to the back of a booth abuts the door 8 inches from the handle. This creates a barrier to entry into the bathroom.

Feature







Solution:

Remove the shelf to provide room adjacent to the door.

Possible Solutions

Feature Bathroom Interior-

- 1) Stall Door Handles- The door handles on the stalls require grasping and turning of the wrist.
- 2) Toilet- The toilet in the women's restroom stall is too low. It is approximately 14" tall. This makes transfers from a wheelchair to the toilet difficult and dangerous.







- Possible Solutions
- 1) Stall Door Handles- Install sliding lever style door hardware.
- 2) Toilet-Replace existing toilet with a taller model
